The place-name is derived from the fact that the area was originally "ta" (rice fields) but later became a "machi" (town). Further back in time, the area was at the bottom of a shallow water zone. Tamachi is now completely urbanized, and by leaving the office buildings behind and climbing a hill, one can enjoy a nice stroll through a quiet residential area, with embassies and museums along the way. The Tamachi Campus is also home to the Tokyo Tech High School of Science and Technology. In addition, since it is located in a business district, the Graduate School of Innovation Management is based here for the convenience of working professionals.

**○ The Great Buddha of Kamakura** If you have half a day to spare, consider a trip to the 13th century capital of Kamakura. The city was the first stronghold for the unique culture of medieval Japan's warrior class, who came to the east in rivalry with the culture of the aristocrats, then flourishing in their stronghold of Kyoto and other parts of western Japan. Kamakura now boasts such a concentration of temples that the entire city may be considered one big museum. The skills of master craftsmen of old can be observed by studying the exquisite timberwork used in the great roofs and gateways of the Zen temples, or by looking up at the face of the 12 meter-tall Great Buddha which has withstood the elements for seven centuries.

**○ Hakone Hot Springs** If you have a full day to spare, a trip to the mountain hot springs of Hakone would be a worthwhile way to spend it. With hot spring water bubbling up throughout the mountains, Hakone is dotted with therapeutic spas that have been frequented by metropolitans for several centuries as their location of choice to relax in body and soul. A nice long dip in an open-air bath is guaranteed to rejuvenate you. Other attractions include the area's unique flora such as the communities of marsh vegetation, and of course, a great view of Mt. Fuji.



**The Ancient Tokaido Highway**  
 There are many interesting sights to be spotted in this area. If you cut across the Tokaido highway from Tamachi Station, turn left and go up Hijirizaka slope and you'll find a wealth of temples on both sides, the historic Hosokawa house (presently the Takamatsunomiya residence) and after that a bird sanctuary (behind Takamatsu Junior High School), and the watch tower of the Nihon Enoki branch of Takanawa Fire Station.
